Ribbon skirt learning highlighted for trustees

The ways in which schools connected Ribbon Skirt Day to curriculum and citizenship education was highlighted during the Saskatoon Board of Education meeting held March 16.

During February, many of the division's elementary and secondary schools celebrated cultural teachings as they relate to the creation and wearing of ribbon skirts. The brightly coloured skirts are a traditional clothing piece for many Indigenous women and girls and honour their heritage, spirit, and identity.

Three members of the Brevoort Park School community — the school's principal along with a Grade 2 student and the student's mother — shared the impact of the learning and experiences at their school, including a virtual assembly that families were invited to attend.

The meeting also provided trustees with an update on the division's strategic plan, focusing on equity. Saskatoon Public Schools is committed to enacting anti-racist and anti-oppressive practices that support anti-racism, reconciliation, solidarity with Indigenous peoples, and freedom of cultural expression for all.

Principals Chantelle Balicki of Brevoort Park and Tammy Girolami of Nutana Collegiate shared how schools are connecting traditional teachings, stories, and education to the philosophy of the curriculum and learning outcomes from kindergarten to Grade 12.




