FROM THE BOARD TABLE

Work on anti-racist, anti-oppressive education highlighted for Board of Education

Members of the school division's Social Justice Disposition Committee (SJDC) shared the work of the committee with trustees during the March 12 meeting of the Saskatoon Board of Education.

The group, comprised mostly of kindergarten to Grade 12 in-school administrators, is learning about anti-racist, anti-oppressive education. The initiative is a result of a commitment by the school division to make a difference in the way staff are supported to create nurturing learning environments and equitable outcomes for Indigenous students, and all students.

Its goal is to transform thinking through awareness of the history of racism, how racism is manifested personally and institutionally, and how it affects the lived experience of students. It has worked with University of Saskatchewan professor Dr. Verna St. Denis, a specialist in the field of anti-racist, anti-oppressive education. The SJDC presented at the national Indspire conference in November.

Other highlights from the meeting were:

 Trustees received a mid-year update on the board's Collegiate Renewal strategic priority. During the current school year, the division is focusing on increased credit attainment for high school students through: outcomes-based assessment and instruction, instructional leadership, and responsive actions of school-based data teams. During the first semester, 82 per cent of Grade 10 students obtained at least four credits by the end of the semester. The overarching goal of Collegiate Renewal is to ensure students are engaged in their learning so they graduate as active participants in lifelong learning and as responsible, caring, culturally responsive citizens.

In schools, the Move To Grow In The Classroom campaign will focus on helping our students understand how they can move their bodies to activate their heart, muscles and brain, all while enhancing their learning. Our goal is for students, parents/caregivers, teachers, staff members, and SCC members to view exercise as an embedded piece of the learning that takes place in our daily schooling.

WHY SHOULD SCHOOLS MOVE TO GROW IN THE CLASSROOM?

- Teachers are in a powerful position to facilitate neurological processes by using BAM activities to enhance academic outcomes in mathematics, reading and writing.
- BAM activities assist students with self-regulation, allowing them to attend and focus for longer periods of instruction time.
- BAM activities get students up and moving throughout the school day, which has a positive impact on their social, emotional and physical well-being.
